OVERVIEW

Cultural competence enables individuals to respect and appreciate the diversity of human experiences and work towards creating inclusive environments that support the needs of diverse populations. A culturally competent practitioner can bridge cultural gaps and reduce misunderstandings between cultures by being aware of, and sensitive to, cultural differences.

EXAMPLES

- **Nursing:** A culturally competent nurse may inquire about a patient's preferred pronouns and use them accordingly, creating an inclusive and affirming environment.
- **Teaching:** A culturally competent teacher may incorporate diverse perspectives into their curriculum to foster a more inclusive and enriching learning experience for students from various cultural backgrounds.
